

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

*An Executive session is requested to discuss personnel matters.

PERSONNEL:

Mark Sanford – remove from payroll as full time Captain effective 8-2-24 Tammy St. Clair – remove from payroll as full time Executive Assistant effective 8-7-24 Kristen Glavach – transfer from full time Lieutenant to full time Captain effective 8-25-24

OPERATIONS:

MAJOR MAINTENANCE / FACILITIES UPDATES:

<u>Kronos Time Keeping Software</u> – In the final stages of testing. The go-live date is anticipated to be within the next one to two payroll periods.

<u>Air Purification System</u> – Project is currently in the data collection / air monitoring phase. Significant improvements in bacterial counts have been seen in the data collected from the first testing samples compared to the baseline samples.

US DOJ WEBINAR

Prison Administration and Medical Administration participated in a webinar held by the Department of Justice on July 23rd regarding Correctional Facilities Obligation to Provide Medications for Opiod Use Disorder under the Americans with Disabilities Act. Solicitor Repak also had staff participate in the webinar. Basically there are two types of Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)..... "Continuation" which is the continuation of the treatment for incarcerated individuals who were prescribed the treatment by an outside doctor prior to coming to jail, AND "Induction" which is screening all new inmates to see if they meet the criteria for treatment and then starting them, under physician's orders, on treatment during their incarceration. We currently only offer "Continuation", which was sufficient under previous DOJ guidance. Based on the new information received from the webinar and DOJ memo (attached), it is the opinion of myself, Solicitor Repak (memorandum previously emailed to all board members), and PrimeCare's Chief Medical Officer (letter attached) that we now need to also implement "Induction" of MAT to avoid future litigation. This is expected to significantly increase our MAT-related pre-diem costs. In addition, PrimeCare will probably need to hire another nurse to conduct MAT, which would require an addendum to our contract. I am requesting today that the board approve the MAT program be expanded to include the "Induction" of MAT for new inmate commitments who qualify.

DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

On August 1st, the DEP came in to inspect our body scanner. This is completed every four years. During the inspection, he found no issues of non-compliance and expressed how impressed he was with the procedures we have in place, and with our staff's knowledge of both the machine and the regulations governing it. A formal letter of compliance should be received within the next few weeks.

VIVITROL GRANT

Vivitrol is a prescription extended-release injection that is used to treat alcohol dependence and opioid addiction. We have been offering this injection through a grant funded program since 2019 to inmates preparing for release. That grant has recently expired. On July 17th, we completed and submitted our application for a new 2024 Vivitrol Grant being offered through PCCD. If we are awarded the funding of \$127,590.00, it will allow us to continue offering Vivitrol injections to inmates preparing for release.

DOC INSPECTION:

On July 29th, we received the final results from our DOC inspection that was held in April and I am pleased to inform you that we have received a FULL COMPLIANCE RATING once again, which will exempt us from an inspection in 2025. I believe this makes 11 consecutive inspection cycles, or 22 consecutive years, that we have received this rating. I would like to acknowledge all of our staff for a job well done and for the time and effort put into ensuring the facility continues to meet the requirements and standards. Deputy Descavish deserves a special acknowledgement as he was the point person for this inspection responsible for the mountains of documentation submission. The finalized Inspection Report is attached.

FCC RULING

On July 18th, the FCC ruled that there will be caps placed on the fees and rates charged to inmates for telephone calls and for video calls. Currently, the prison phone calls cost 21 cents/minute for Interstate calls, 30 cents/minute for Intrastate calls, and 40 cents/minute for video calls. Under the new caps, phone calls must be reduced to 7 cents/minute and video calls must be reduced to 12 cents/minute. The ruling also affects the fees that Viapath can charge to inmates/families for using their services. I have reached out to our Viapath rep to gain more insight into this change and was advised that once their internal legal discussions have taken place over this ruling, he will schedule a meeting with us. However, he anticipates that prison commissions will be significantly reduced and may be eliminated altogether. Currently, we receive a guaranteed minimum of \$175,000/year in commissions from our phone and videos calls. This ruling is slated to go into effect in 2025. I have forwarded the entire 467 page order and the attached press release to Solicitor Repak for his review.

Correctional Facilities' Obligation to Provide Medications for Re:

Opioid Use Disorder Under the Americans with Disabilities Act:

Reminders and a July 23, 2024 Webinar

Dear Superintendent / Warden:

The United States Attorney's Offices for the Eastern, Middle, and Western Districts of Pennsylvania enforce the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA") and protect the rights of individuals in treatment for Opioid Use Disorder ("OUD"), including those individuals currently incarcerated in prisons and jails in Pennsylvania.

As you may know, in November 2023, the United States Attorney's Office for the Western District of Pennsylvania resolved an ADA matter with the Allegheny County Jail for failure to provide inmates medication to treat OUD.1 And, in December 2023, the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania filed a

Statement of Interest in a matter against a Delaware County correctional facility to clarify state and local jails' obligations under the ADA to provide inmates with access to medication to treat OUD.²

Over the course of this enforcement work, we have discovered that correctional facilities across the Commonwealth have questions about their obligations under the ADA. We summarize those obligations below. To further address this need, our Offices will host a webinar on **July 23, 2024**, at 10 AM, to discuss the legal framework surrounding, scientific bases for, and administrative benefits of, providing medication-assisted treatment to incarcerated persons with OUD. We strongly encourage you and members of your security and medical staff to attend.

At this webinar, a panel that includes a medical expert and prison administrators from other jurisdictions will review the applicable ADA requirements, the medical standards of care, and the logistical framework surrounding these issues. In addition, DEA personnel will provide an update regarding the recent changes to 42 C.F.R. Part 8, which allow correctional facilities registered as hospitals/clinics to treat patients with methadone under the exemption available to hospitals/clinics.³ There will also be an opportunity for you and your staff to ask questions of the panel. To register, please email USAPAE.RSVP@usdoj.gov with your name, title, and facility by July 15, 2024.

Obligations of Correctional Facilities Under the ADA

During the webinar, we will summarize your legal obligations under federal law. Under the ADA, Pennsylvania correctional facilities cannot deny healthcare services, including lawfully prescribed medications, to individuals in custody based upon the type of medication prescribed, including buprenorphine (Suboxone), naltrexone, or methadone—all of which are used to treat OUD. Individuals with OUD or being

treated with medication for OUD are generally considered disabled and protected by the ADA.

Correctional facilities that provide healthcare services may not change or discontinue an individual's medication used to treat OUD except upon a licensed healthcare provider's determination that the individual does not require that treatment based on the individual's current condition. Correctional facilities must also offer treatment with medication for OUD to all individuals in custody for whom such treatment is medically appropriate and train their staff in the requirements of the ADA.

Further information on how the ADA protects individuals with or recovering from OUD is available at https://www.ada.gov/topics/opioid-use-disorder/. The Justice Department's Bureau of Justice Assistance and National Institute of Corrections also issued comprehensive guidance in June 2023 that we encourage facilities to consult, available at https://bja.ojp.gov/library/publications/guidelines-managing-substance-withdrawal-jails.

We hope that this letter and the July 23, 2024 webinar will enhance your understanding of medication-assisted treatment for OUD, prompt you to review your existing policies, and ensure your facility complies with the non-discrimination requirements of the ADA.

This morning several of our team members attended the Department of Justice's (DOJ) webinar on MOUD treatment in county-level correctional facilities. From the attendee list, we noticed a number of you had representatives on the webinar as well. We wanted to provide a general overview and, again, offer further discussions as this treatment modality expands in your facility.

As the correspondence of June 17, 2024 announcing the webinar detailed, the DOJ takes the position that everyone with an opioid use disorder diagnosis is to receive one of the three forms of FDA approved medications (Methadone, Buprenorphine, or Naltrexone). This group includes not only those receiving such treatment prior to incarceration (commonly referred to as "maintenance" treatment), but also those who are not ("induction"). Although the DOJ takes the legal standpoint that the treatment must be offered, they did not provide a rigid format as to what the treatment must look like at your particular facility. The DOJ recognizes that as a medical treatment, the details of the treatment must be decided by a licensed physician, physician assistant or certified registered nurse practitioner. Fortunately, PrimeCare has been offering this treatment for a number of years and has policies and training in place to address the expansion of this treatment program.

Although the DOJ made it clear the treatment is required and they repeatedly referenced their enforcement efforts utilizing the legal system, they did not establish a hard and fast deadline as to when you must start a program that includes induction. However, although the demeanor of the letter and webinar were professional and informative in nature, we do believe if a full fledge MOUD program is not operational in the not-too-distant future, the next communication from the DOJ will be more of an enforcement effort. From our past experience, our EMR is already set to assist in the identification of those likely to qualify for the program and we have in place evidence-based assessment tools.

We have already had discussions with most of our facilities and shared that PrimeCare's philosophy supports this treatment tool. We know that this philosophy is not equally shared by all county officials. If any of you questions or would like to schedule a meeting with other county stakeholders please let us know.

Due to the Cambria County Prison meeting or exceeding Title 37, Chapter 95 compliance, the facility is granted a biennial inspection cycle. As such, the next inspection for this facility will be 2026.



FCC CAPS EXORBITANT PHONE & VIDEO CALL RATES FOR INCARCERATED PERSONS & THEIR FAMILIES

The Martha Wright-Reed Act Empowered the FCC to Close Gaps in the Long-Fought-For Protections Against Predatory Rates

WASHINGTON, July 18, 2024—The Federal Communications Commission today voted to end exorbitant phone and video call rates that have burdened incarcerated people and their families for decades. Under the new rules, the cost of a 15-minute phone call will drop to \$0.90 from as much as \$11.35 in large jails and, in small jails, to \$1.35 from \$12.10. The new rules also, for the first time, address the exorbitant cost of video visitation calls, dropping those prices to less than a quarter of current prices and requiring per-minute rate options based on consumers' actual usage. The rules also prohibit "site commission" payments and bar added fees to incarcerated people's communications services (IPCS) services.

Communities nationwide benefit from incarcerated people staying connected to their families. The recently adopted Martha Wright-Reed Just and Reasonable Communications Act empowered the FCC to close the final loopholes in the communications system which has had detrimental effects on families and recidivism rates nationwide. The Act removes the principal statutory limitations that had prevented the Commission from setting comprehensive just and reasonable rates for IPCS—namely, limits to the Commission's ability to regulate rates for intrastate calls and video communications.

The new rules significantly lower existing per-minute rate caps, based on providers' reported costs, for out-of-state and international audio calls from any type of correctional facility, and apply those rate caps to in-state audio calls. And, for the first time, the rules set interim per-minute rate caps for video communications, including video visitation. The rules also lower the overall prices consumers pay by eliminating the ability to impose separate ancillary service charges.

Under the new rules, providers are prohibited from making site commission payments for IPCS and preempt state and local laws and regulations requiring such commissions. The rules also limit the costs associated with safety and security measures that can be recovered in the per-minute IPCS rates to only those costs that the Commission finds are used and useful in the provision of IPCS.

The new call rates will be \$0.06 per minute for prisons and large jails, \$0.07 for medium jails, \$0.09 for small jails, and \$0.12 for very small jails, and as low as \$0.11/minute for video calls—with a requirement that per-minute rates be offered. These changes mean existing Commission per-minute rate caps for voice services will fall by more than half for the overwhelming majority of IPCS consumers and the establishment of new, initial interim per-minute rate caps for video

communications services, such as video conferencing and video visitation. Compliance with the new rate caps will be phased in based on the size of the correctional institution and other factors.

The rules also simplify the pricing structure by incorporating the costs of ancillary services into the rate caps while allowing IPCS providers to offer alternate pricing plans for IPCS. The rules strengthen IPCS accessibility requirements for incarcerated people with disabilities and the Commission's IPCS consumer disclosure rules.
